

Scenario Deck 1

My work uniform isn't clean, and my shift starts in 3 hours. The laundromat costs \$5 but I only have \$15 left for bus fare for the rest of the week. Do I:

(a) Wash at the laundromat but lack the bus fare for the end of the week; or

(b) Wear a regular t-shirt today and save my bus fare so I can get to work later in the week.

Scenario Deck 1

My cousin is giving me a ride to work but just texted that he is running 45 minutes late and the local bus takes an hour to get to work. Do I:

- (a) Wait for my cousin and show up significantly late; or
- (b) Leave now to catch the public bus, but using my lunch money to pay for fare.

Scenario Deck 1

The supervisor
reprimanded me in front of
the crew for a mistake that
was actually made by my
coworker. Do I:

- (a) Stay completely quiet
for now but ask to speak
with the supervisor
privately at the end of the
shift; or
- (b) Talk to my coworker
and ask her to inform the
supervisor that she was the
one that made the
mistake.

Scenario Deck 2

My new job requires
steel-toe boots for
safety, but I can't afford
them and don't get
paid until next Friday.

Do I:

(a) Wear sneakers and
really thick socks; or (b)
Borrow my cousin's old
winter boots that are
two sizes too big.

Scenario Deck 2

My supervisor gave me a company transit card to deliver blueprints across town. I just realized that I accidentally left the card at home. I have to deliver the blueprints today. Do I:

(a) Use \$10 of my personal money to cover the fare; or (2) Let the supervisor know I forgot the card.

Scenario Deck 2

A coworker is falling behind and actively slowing down our team's daily production target. Our team's weekly bonus is on the line. Do I:

(a) Take over the coworker's tasks quietly to ensure we hit our target; or

(b) Work only on my assigned task so the supervisor sees who is failing.
